grounds surround a stately antebellum mansion. Built in 1850, the mansion has been restored to reflect the sumptuous elegance of the nineteenth century and furnished with antiques and decorative arts of the period. TJBS concerts take place on the porch of the Carriage House, which has one of the largest antique carriage collections in the South. Tours are available seven days a week including concert Sundays up to 5:00 p.m. There is a gift shop open until 5:00 p.m. on Sundays and a good restaurant, also open on Sundays. Concert ticket gates officially open at 5:00 p.m.; concerts start at 6:00 p.m. You can enter by car from Harding Road or from Leake Avenue, and both entrances have paved parking at no charge. There are bathrooms and a water fountain on site. Dress is casual. During July the sun can be quite warm in the seating area until it descends behind the trees at about 6:30. The series is family oriented. Kids and pets are welcome, but pets must be on a leash and well-behaved. You can bring any kind of food and drink, but no grilling or cooking is allowed.

TJBS concert tickets are \$15 per person or \$10 for TJBS members. This year, members may purchase a subscription ticket to the entire series of four concerts for \$25 per person.

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JAZZ in Cookeville

The second annual Jazz In Cookeville event, scheduled for Saturday, June 19, will feature some of the biggest national and local names in jazz. Sponsored by Regional Radiology, AmSouth Bank of Cookeville, Regions Bank, WMOT-JAZZ89, WCTE-TV 22, and the Department of Music and Art at Tennessee Technological University, the event is free and open to the public, but donations for WMOT will be accepted. The festival will benefit WMOT-JAZZ89 and Mentoring Scientific Minds, a local program for young people interested in the sciences.

Scheduled from noon to 6:00 p.m., the event will be held at the Dogwood Park Amphitheater on Broad Street in downtown Cookeville. The headliner for this year's event will be Julia Rich, the girl singer for the Glenn Miller Orchestra (GMO) for over 15 years. Rich is also an accomplished songwriter and artist with four jazz CDs to her credit. For Jazz In Cookeville, she will introduce a new song, "The Pirate." The song will be especially appealing to Johnny Depp fans, if you savvy! Rich will be performing from 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Rich is a Nashville native and graduate of Middle Tennessee State University. She has worked with and learned from many fine musicians on the road including GMO leaders Larry O'Brien and Dick Gerhart; singers Jeannie Dennis, Joe Francis, Bryan Anthony, and Nick Hilscher; and players Mike Duva, Marc Vinci, Andy Hagan, Bill Washer, and Richy Barz. During Rich's tenure with the GMO, the band performed with such notables as The Mills Brothers, Helen O'Connell, Rosemary Clooney, Mel Torme, Lynn Roberts, Kay Starr, Connie Haines, Teresa Brewer, Jerry Vale, the Four Aces, Kathie Lee Gifford, Joan Shepherd, and former GMO leader Buddy DeFranco. Rich has recorded two albums for Cardinal Records: *I'll Take Romance* and *The Way You Make Me Feel*. She also has out "If I Spoke French" and "A Little Taste." Leading off the event at noon will be the Chad Anderson Trio performing with guest vocalist Kelley Hurt. Chad is a drummer hailing from Mississippi. Also appearing with Chad will be Chris Parker on piano and John Birdsong on bass. Chad, who has three CDs to his credit, will soon have a fourth release available with his current trio. Appearing at 1:30 p.m. will be the Jim Ferguson Quartet. Ferguson has two jazz CD releases on the Dutch label Challenge/A-Records. These CDs have earned a great deal of national press including feature articles in the *Sunday New York Times*, *Jazz Times*, *Jazziz*, *Jazz Improv Magazine*, the *International Jazz Educator's Journal*, *Monterey County Post*, *LA Jazz Scene*, England's *Jazz Journal* and *Double Bassist*

magazines, *Commentary* magazine, *Bass Player* magazine, *52nd Street Jazz.com*, *All About Jazz.com* (editor's pick), *NPR Jazz.com*, Oregon's *Jazz Scene* magazine, and the *Washington City Paper*. He has been the featured guest on *Marian McPartland's Piano Jazz* and has been included in an episode of *Jazz Profiles* with Nancy Wilson (two national programs distributed by National Public Radio and broadcast on WMOT). Jim will be performing with exceptional artists Rahsaan Barber, Bruce Dudley, and Jim White.

The Pearson/Ferguson/White Trio goes onstage at 3:00 p.m. featuring Jack Pearson on guitar, Jim Ferguson on upright bass, and Jim White on drums. Pearson, a native of Nashville has released three CDs. He is a former member of the Allman Brothers Band and has worked with such artists as Richard "Groove" Holmes, Jimmy Raney, Bobby "Blue" Bland, Buddy DeFranco, Jimmy Smith, Jimmy Buffet, Mundell Lowe, and Faith Hill. Jim White has played with Maynard Ferguson's Big Bop Nouveau Band, Joey DeFrancesco, Jeff Coffin, and others.

Between acts, K.C. Martin and Full Surkle will perform, and Greg Lee, WMOT program director, will emcee and conduct giveaways from the stage including restaurant gift certificates, merchandise, and more. CDs from all artists will be available for sale at the WMOT booth.

Local food vendors with booths will include Crawdaddy's Westside Grill (located on Broad Street), The DogHouse (located on Cedar Street), Thomas Andrews Restaurant (located on Broad Street), Spanky's (located on Ninth Street), and Smoothie King (located on Bunker Hill Road). In the event of rain, the festival will be moved to Wattenbarger Auditorium on the Tennessee Tech campus. No alcohol or pets are allowed, but bring lawn chairs and blankets. Additional sponsors include Baymont Inn on South Jefferson Street in Cookeville, the *Herald-Citizen* in Cookeville, and Lamar Outdoor Advertising.

Jazz In Cookeville is organized by jazz aficionado Dr. Mel Rapelyea, a local physician who founded the highly successful Chestertown Jazz Festival on the eastern shore of Maryland. Dr. Rapelyea and three of his colleagues relocated to Cookeville to staff the Department of Medical Imaging at Cookeville Regional Medical Center. He and Dr. Oplless Walker, director of pharmacy at the hospital, have started Mentoring Scientific Minds, a program for young people interested in the sciences.

WMOT-JAZZ89 is the nonprofit public broadcasting radio station of Middle Tennessee State University. WMOT has been on the air since 1969, broadcasting all jazz since 1982. Twice nominated as a Gavin Report Jazz Station of the Year, a national recognition, WMOT has also garnered over 60 Associated Press awards for local news reporting and features. WMOT relies on federal and state funding and listener support with memberships and corporate/business support.

JAZZ On The Side for June Presents Famous Jam Sessions

JAZZ on the Side is a one-hour music and documentary radio program dedicated to telling the "rest of the jazz story." Sidemen who played the music, vocalists who sang the music, and composers who created the music are put in the spotlight every Sunday at noon on JAZZ89. The reprise of our special series of famous recorded jam sessions is being broadcast this month with some classic and rare sets led by trumpeter Buck Clayton. June 6: Jam Sessions, Vol. 1, "The Buck Clayton Sessions"

The most famous recorded jam sessions of the '50s were those led by Count Basie trumpet man Buck Clayton. On both domestic and very rare European sessions, you'll hear swing stars such as Coleman Hawkins, Ruby Braff, J. C. Higginbotham, the great Jimmy Rushing, and more.

June 13: Jam Sessions, Vol. 2, "Miles Davis, Chet Baker, and the Lighthouse All-Stars"

On the West Coast, no sessions were cooler than the Sunday all-day jams at the Lighthouse in the early '50s. You'll be

sitting on the front row when "cool" trumpet legends Davis and Baker drop by to battle it out with Shelly Manne, Max Roach, Bud Shank, Bob Cooper, and others.

June 20: Jam Sessions, Vol. 3, "The Prestige Detroit Sessions"

Many great late '50s hard bop recordings were essentially jam sessions, but the Prestige studios hosted so many all-star jams that their vaults are still yielding surprises. Heaviest hitters were the guys from Detroit: Donald Byrd, Pepper Adams, Kenny Burrell, Elvin Jones, and others.

June 27: Jam Sessions, Vol. 4, "The Gene Ammons Sessions"

Of all the great jam session recordings on Prestige, the most popular were led by Gene Ammons in the 1950s. His huge tenor sax sound and relaxed style was the perfect match for frequent guests such as John Coltrane, Art Farmer, Pepper Adams, Jackie McLean, Kenny Burrell, Paul Quinichette, Paul Chambers, and Art Taylor.
